Musical Director's Message: by Bill Litz

In the wake of **completing the 2019 contest cycle**, we all end up doing a lot of **reflection**. I would bet that pretty much every chapter, every quartet, and every singer comes away from that experience feeling like they aren't as good as they hoped they were. At least those that didn't finish in first place, and even they all fight their own personal demons and disappointments.

I personally felt on top of the world... We improved so much as a chorus and as individuals in the process of preparing for contest. During our warm-up on Saturday, **I couldn't have been more proud** of the impromptu performance we did in the lobby of the *Double Tree Hotel*. Everyone was **smiling**, our **musicality was wonderful** and we felt like winners. Passers by seemed to share in that feeling with us. Even with the glitches in getting to the stage (and after seeing the video of our performance), I was (and still am) very proud of our performance. ...Then when the scores came out, and we faced the comments of the judges, that feeling turned to **frustration, failure** on different levels, and **maybe not being good enough**.

than the beginner has even tried.

With that **personal struggle** going on in my brain – **success vs. failure** – I happened across a YouTube video titled ["I Was Arrogant To Say This..."](#). It challenges us to *"Always see yourself and think like a beginner"*. All of the Portsmen ARE beginners – some to singing, some to barbershop, some to the contest world – but all of us to making music together as an ensemble that changes every day with different songs and different members.

Consider insights to not be scared of being a beginner, starting each experience with an open mind to learning:

- 1. Document the progression** – Seeing the change is a great reward.
We have and I was reminded about how much more entertaining and musical we are compared to a year ago.

- 2. Rely on a community for education, support and inspiration.**
*Friends can make you feel joyful even when things get rough.
Keep a smile on your face no matter how you feel inside (that acceptance allows help to arrive).
You might need words of encouragement – accept those words and make celebrations of successes.
Sometimes your support will leave you "behind" – you might feel on your own but keep trying and growing.
Talk yourself through something - too many talk themselves out of things.*

- 3. Experience has more value when it overcomes a little bit of failure or fear.**
*There will be tough uphill battles – sometimes the conditions will be far from perfect.
Being out of your comfort zone will create emotional moments – cry, laugh, rest, gather thoughts, start again.
Even when you start to feel confident – other crashes will come - take a deep breath...continue.*

- 4. Accept help, accept guidance and let your helpers challenge you.**
*Be the worst "player in the room" - when everybody in the room is better it gives you incentive to grow.
Don't delude yourself into thinking you are the best in the room
- objectively or subjectively, you will tend to "half-ass" it.*

5. We only regret the things we don't do.

Most adults avoid being bad at anything. Growth is trial and error. Mostly error! 😊

- You gotta have the guts to be bad long enough to get good!

6. Although it's sometimes good to be competitive, sometimes there really is no competition there.

Remember everyone is on their own journey and there is enough room for everyone to succeed.

Everyone at the top of their game, everyone competing at any level, or exhibiting incredible talent, has failed hundreds, if not thousands of times. There isn't a problem with failing. It's how you deal with it and how you pick yourself up again. There is no time for bad behavior or showing off your insecurities – just time to prepare for the next performance.

Trivia Question

How do you know who the best barbershopper at a contest is?"
Is it their outfit, the songs they know, how loud they sing, their circle of friends or the score they achieved?

The real answer is that, "Somewhere at the contest, some one person got more fun out of the day than anybody else. That person wins, and they are the best barbershopper of the contest."

Derick will also be filling in for Bob for the Fall Show.

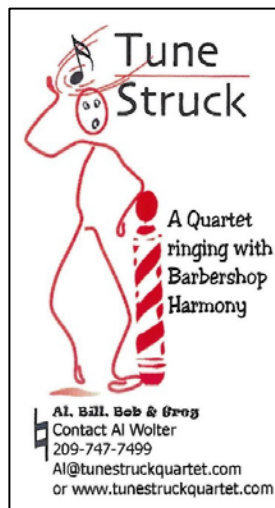

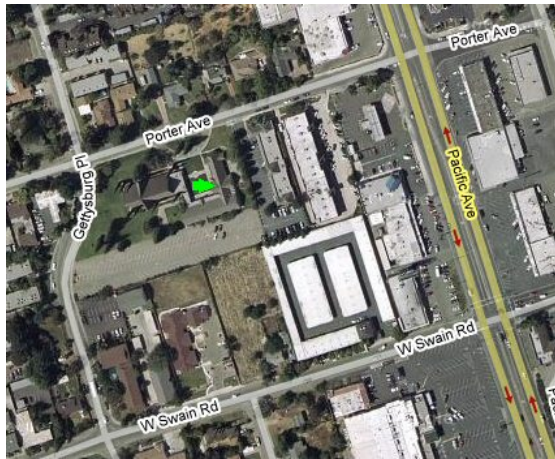
