Musical Director's Message: by Bill Litz

Until recently I hadn't really thought much about the fraternal aspect of the Barbershop Harmony Society or the Portsmen. I think of it as a singing and performing outlet. Most of my concentration is focused on encouraging better singing and performing.

Even though my best friends are my barbershop friends, I often take those relationships for granted. As long as my quartet and chorus mates have the same basic goals, we all enjoy each other's company. But as we see more opportunities for performing and competing in front of us (or maybe not enough opportunities), we can feel a little friction as our commitment is questioned.

What things do you desire in your barbershop experience?

- To sing better personally
- Making friends to share experiences
- To build community relationships
- To help others sing better
- To introduce barbershop to others

More importantly, what things do you desire for other people in your quartet or chorus in their barbershop experience? That is where we too often fail in enjoying our time together. We think their experience should be the same as what we want.

The expectations we have for others need to be understood and agreed to, so that we don't become frustrated with our chorus experience. We need to each live up to what is required, bringing our emotions and talents to our meetings/rehearsals and performances.

The COVID-19 influence on our getting together has made me even more aware of the differences in what we each want and need to feel motivated and fulfilled. I miss my quartet gathering and look forward to when we can get together next. Having four people make a decision – with similar goals and desires and the same plan for being prepared – is a world away from getting the chorus on the same page. I look forward to finding a new balance of what that means as we go forward this year with limited performance opportunities and the fears we may all encounter in regards to meeting while this virus is active.

As your director, this is how I've seen the Portsmen:

- We are group that is welcoming and encouraging to all singers
We should be friendly and personable, leaving worries and troubles of the world at the door
- We are each teachers AND students
Don't hold back your best while waiting for others to get up to speed – that doesn't help them be better
Make sure *you* are not making others wait for you to learn or try something new
Not everyone can read music – we need to help them to learn the music

As a nonprofit organization, the Barbershop Harmony Society understands and embraces the transformative power of harmony. We know that group harmonizing can help:

- improve physical and emotional health
- build healthier communities
- young people become healthier adults
- forge inter-generational bonds
- reduce barriers across diverse cultures and groups

- We are a group that is continually learning
We try new songs and styles with varying degrees of difficulty
This is probably the most troubling place in that some people learn easily
and others need to work harder to learn and memorize
- We are performers – not professionals but performers nonetheless
Not everyone is a seasoned performer – we need to help them to be more outgoing
We need to be prepared to entertain at a moment's notice – we need to be better at being ready
- We are volunteers
We each have different schedules and different amounts of time available
We each need to be involved in choosing our direction and goals

You each see the Portsmen a little differently. It's important that we share our visions and desires for the chorus and for each other. And to do this in was that inspires and encourages each other.

I've felt a little paralyzed in knowing what to do in regards to so many things during our "Shelter in Place". I suspect that it will be another month before we are able to meet together. I miss our fellowship. I miss the harmony we make together.

I encourage you to sing. I encourage you to check on each other. I encourage you to be safe. Be on the lookout for some new ways to communicate as a chapter and to plan for what we will be doing when we next see each other. I'm excited about the time when we can get back together and to be able to sing again for our families, friends and community.

The operation of a Barbershop Chapter should be an easy thing; everything revolves around singing and singing well, right? Seems pretty straight-forward.

But before you can sing something, you need someone to sing it with. That means there has to be members. Finding and keeping members is not as straight-forward as one would hope. Lots of folks like to sing, they sing in the shower, in the car, at concerts, in churches and schools, in choirs, and on stage in musicals and plays. So getting them to visit, get hooked on the sound and then stay members for life is a piece of cake – NOT!

For starters, there are lots of different ideas about Barbershop singing (from 'it's too hard' to 'it's not properly disciplined' to 'only non-serious people do that') and our collective lives only get busier each day making it hard to find the time.

Still, Al Farnum had the perfect answer Tuesday, January 7, 2020 when talking about selling Valentines – “you have to ask!” Ask who? Ask anyone you know or run into that you note are singing: “do you like to sing,” “where do you sing,” “have you ever thought about singing A’ Capella harmony?”

You do not have to be a salesperson; you just have to be confident in what you do / are as a Barbershopper, be a little observant, and ask anyone who you see that might be a benefit to the Chapter. But you need to be prepared for rejection – not because you did anything wrong – it is just the way it is.

If you get turned down, just look for the next opportunity. If you think that a friend would really be a good fit, however, keep asking. Don't be a pest, but don't give up either.

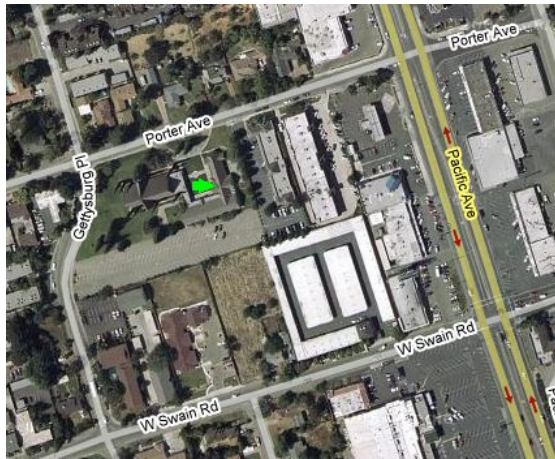
