One of those things is to find three other part singers and have yourselves a quartet or quartet+ rehearsal on your own. Organized quartets should sing through Chorus songs (as the chorus sings them) every once and a while. The more each individual feels confident on their part, the better collective sound we will make.

Lastly, learning other people's jobs includes what the Board and Music Team do, how they function and what the rules are. Everyone is welcome to observe Board Meetings and Music Team meetings. Each military unit has to have turnover and thus there is always training going on. As the one in charge of our helm, I hope through the year that I will be able to help many of you to know and understand the administrative workings of the Chapter. All good Blue Water work.

Here's to being able to answer a standard bell and making some decent headway, with calm seas and following winds.

As many of you know, I'm undergoing a change in my life – I'm working on identifying as a baritone..... So, I wanted to share a little bit about that process of teaching an old dog new tricks. It's both exciting and frustrating. In some ways I feel like I'm a newbie, just like many of you chorus members are. Even if you have been a barbershopper or singer for a long time, when we add a new song to the repertoire, you get to be a newbie again, so I think we can all benefit from analyzing how to get past the frustrations of feeling inadequate to feeling accomplished.

Even for me, barbershop is a hobby in that *a hobby is an activity done regularly in one's leisure time for pleasure. Participation in hobbies encourages acquiring substantial skills and knowledge in that area.* In order to find barbershop pleasurable, we need to improve our skills to get past the frustrations of NOT BEING ABLE TO SING AND PERFORM. In my transition two baritone, two things stand out:

- Being able to learn the music
- Being able to sing the music

And it may seem obvious, but each of those take time. The notes and words don't magically appear in my head and the ability to sing different notes doesn't happen by being silent – the THINK SYSTEM does not put ideas in our long-term memory or develop muscles for singing.

As I started working on learning the baritone notes, I found myself singing daily...you know...the thing I encourage you to do every week and in the director message every month. And surprise!!! Of course, I knew I had to work on learning the new baritone notes, but singing every day helped me exercise my voice.

Honestly, the process scares me a little. I feel strong as a lead (although I do know I have weaknesses). Singing baritone is like learning a foreign language. I hope to be fluent someday, but it's going to take effort — more than I anticipated. I'm sure you all have the same feeling when we start a new song that will take learning new words and maybe a new style or utilize notes in our range that we aren't used to singing. I feel frustrated when I don't know every note (and every word) that makes up my part. I don't want to be the person that is keeping the group from sounding good.

As I practice every day, as I sing at rehearsals with my quartet, as I sing with the chorus and with pick up quartets after rehearsal, I get the joy of feeling capable again.

Making and taking the time to turn my hobby into a lifestyle is the most difficult part. I need to convince my brain that I only need to spend a few minutes at a time on my hobby to accomplish things. The <u>article referenced</u> about time management says, "It's possible to have multiple hobbies, and even get pretty good at several of them. Just putting in 30-60 minutes a day can lead

to remarkable results." I believe it can even be less than that. Singing through songs on the way to work or while doing any chore can be that little bit that helps you remember your parts and exercise your voice for today. This can apply to other things in your life as well like other hobbies and personal relationships.

Making barbershop a lifestyle DOES NOT demand ALL your focus. It just takes enough time to let go of daily annoyances for a few minutes to sing and smile.
