To some, this may be a strange title for the President's Message in a Barbershop Chapter Newsletter, but those of you who have been reading my "Views form the Helm" will likely get that I am talking about our recent visit to Davis and the Combined NorCal Divisions Convention and Contests.

While there is no violence and bloodshed associated with this event, anyone who doesn't believe that there is a bit of a conflict going on here lives under a rock. Contraire, there are lots of "one-up-man-ship" conflicts happening all at once. Rivalries between Divisions, Chapters, friends, and acquaintances abound as we gather to see who is better now.

While it is great to see folks from other Chapters, quartets, divisions, and the like, most of us would like to show off how we have improved and how we are better than you. I know of no quartet or chorus that hasn't waited with bated breath for the announcements and acted like school kids when their name was called as the winner. Just think of 'Never too Late' when they were named Northeastern Division Champs (did any of you question that?).

So, like any good campaign — it is time to review the action of our trip to Davis after the facts. First and foremost, we had good participation from our regular members, not relying on "non-regulars' to bolster the ranks. We missed Joan, who was under the weather, and a couple of folks that have stopped being regulars with work and other obligations. Our core group of 15 singers and a director made a decent showing of ourselves. At the last couple of gatherings, I expressed how proud I was of the products we were putting out in our contest set. I think you can easily see the difference between the up-tune we have sung for years and the ballad we have just started singing in the past six weeks or so. Still, we earned solid numbers, and I will say that, personally, I think a little politics crept into the scoring (not necessarily in our favor).

This was the first time to compete for several of us, and I have heard nothing but positive remarks about those individual's experiences. That is good to hear. I have become a bit jaded about contests over the years. My quartet didn't compete, and it was easy for me to explain away as we really could not see a benefit to us. Many will say that is a bit of a selfish attitude, but one needs to do things for a purpose. On the other hand, there were lots of potential positives for both "Three Lads & Alas!" and "Royal Flush," and I am proud to say that they received most if not all of them. Can truly say that both represented the Chapter very well and still have lots of promise for the future.

One of the benefits(?) of Contests is the Evaluation Session, where the competitor hears from the Judges on what they say they observed and how one can improve in the future. That question mark is not a typo, for me these can be good, bad, or indifferent – giving good, bad or oft-times conflicting information. The Chorus had a good session on performance, with some actionable advice. "Three Lads and ALAS!" session was also very helpful, in my mind as an observer. "Royal Flush" got the indifferent bordering on bad – I have some ideas on why that might be, but as they won't help this discussion or their outlook, I'll keep them to myself.

The key to all these evaluations is to pick out the things that hit home with the potential of improving and leave the ones that don't behind. I think we should use the "sing to someone" focus, and I thought I did – till I realized I didn't enough. Finding the collective 'someone' for a quartet and/or the chorus may be easier for some songs than for others, and maintaining the emotional focus each time its sung may be very hard. The more you do it, the less it becomes work and is just how you sing.

So, the bottom line of this review is that we had a good outing, while we didn't break the 70-score barrier, we are knocking on the door. One of the things that may help us is in gaining numbers, but as I said earlier – very proud that this was us, no 'ringers.' We came away with as the Northeast AA Championship, "Three Lads and Alas!" are the Northeast Novice Champions. Our Show will feature not only these Champions, but also the Northeast Senior Quartet Champions, Claim Jumpers, and the Northeast Quartet Champions "Never Too Late." These facts won't necessarily bring folks to come see us, but it shouldn't have driven them away. Hoping you sold tickets with this news.

Musical Director's Message:

It's exciting to present the *Portsmen's* 66th Annual Show this month – Sentimental Journey. I'm not sure how that number works out with COVID having shut us down, our last show being in 2019 (since we have done more than one show some years, maybe the count is still good). But it does get us back to thinking about performance. Fortunately, we just had the pleasure of competing (and winning the Plateau AA trophy) in the Far Western Northeast Division competition a couple weeks ago to whet our appetite for being on stage.

We've spent three years singing in a circle for each other instead of communicating to an audience. That has given us a chance to work on being better singers and learning more about the barbershop style. With our sound, being the best that the *Portsmen* have ever produced, it makes it easier for us to be performers. I think in the past, we have been concerned going on stage, that our product wasn't good enough.

I went to the **Bay Area Harmony Sweepstakes** *A Cappella Festival* over the weekend (sadly there were NO barbershop groups). There were many musical moments to enjoy. It's remarkable how many styles and textures the Acapella genre encompasses. As we have The Barbershop Harmony Society (BHS) for barbershop singers, The Contemporary A Cappella Society (CASA) exists to create a learning environment about A Cappella music and create a place for competition.

The most noticeable thing in the competition is that the harmony of the groups isn't what we are used to in the barbershop world. There is usually a melody singer, a bass singer and vocal percussionist backed by singers doing harmony. Getting the balance of each part to be right is an art in and of itself. As the groups add more singers to do harmonies and counter rhythms, the sound can get overwhelming. For a group to be good, each person needs to know when to bring out their part when it's the focus and how to get out of the way when they are not.

Acapella performers have the same problems we barbershoppers have as performers – that is to be visually appealing and genuine. Selection of what to wear and how to move can add to or distract from the quality of the performance.

The Acapella support community is probably just as nice to its people as our BHS community is to us. We are ALL amateurs and give each other leeway and encouragement to perform.

As I observed the contest, I was reminded at how singing barbershop is a pretty easy and safe way to approach Acapella music.

- Configuration of the Group
 - ➢ BHS singers fit into 4 voicings − Tenor, Lead (Melody), Baritone and Bass singers
 - Quartets or Choruses that can range from 10 to 150+ singers
 - CASA Lead (Melody), Harmony, Bass and Vocal Percussion (Beat box) singers
 - Small groups from 5 to 15 singers although there are also some Acapella choruses
- Arrangements
 - ➤ BHS has many arrangements for different skill levels and high-quality arrangers that make it easy to get started in a group. There is also a segment of singers that *woodshed* arrangements (making them up spontaneously).
 - ❖ CASA most groups have a unique set of voices so they come up with their own arrangements this can make for chords structures and voicings that can be great or a train wreck. And as groups incorporate jazz harmonies, the knowledge and ear of each singer can make or break the group's appeal.
- Song Selection

- ➢ BHS being officially The Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc. does in fact have mostly songs that are older but there are also more contemporary arrangements. The style is better on songs that have a singable melody that has a more complex chord progression than many contemporary, one chord songs.
- ❖ CASA The world is your oyster, but since most groups are emulating "a band", the lead singer, the bass singer and beat boxer carry most of the musical load. The ability of the harmony singers to create a believable and entertaining backup for the lead singer opens the door for creativity.

Amplification

- ➤ BHS -Usually a couple mics can handle every situation and there isn't a skill level in using them except for *being afraid to step up to the mic*. I love that as barbershoppers we can step out and sing anywhere, anytime.
- CASA Every voice needs to be mic'd and balanced. So that can be a mixer with 15 wireless mics set up with very special considerations for the Bass and Beat Boxer. I wonder how groups practice and how they sound unmic'd.

Costuming

- ➤ BHS Even though the stereotypical attire for a barbershop quartet would include a striped vest and straw hats, that is no longer the norm. Usually, the attire for quartets and choruses is something dressy that matches or a costume that fits into a dramatic presentation of the song.
- ❖ CASA Most groups I've seen are trying to just look like normal people on stage. Sometimes they match but it seems like the attire isn't as much as a concern, which can lead to the lack of concern turning into a distraction.

Choreography

- ▶ BHS Movement is either non-existent or over the top. Top level choruses create dramas in their contest packages that can make performances awe inspiring. Since most choruses perform on risers, that limits the movement, but it can also give a height that allows for movement that gets lost on a flat stage. Some quartets add some dance or special moves to their performance but generally they are trying to simply tell the story of the song with authenticity.
- ❖ CASA Even though most performances are on a flat stage, the performers move around more, filling the stage with activity. With each performer being mic'd, cords used to be a concern (and might be in certain venues), but with groups using wireless setups, movement is less

restricted. But holding mics still has an effect on what movements can be done.

Content Rating

- ➤ BHS prides itself on presenting *Family Friendly* material. Even though that might be a limitation, I believe that many subjects can be handled with ingenuity. It sometimes takes effort to rein in material that might be in bad taste, but I see that as a bonus.
- CASA Be prepared for anything. As in many current theatrical productions, modern Acapella groups may do material that IS NOT G rated or may dress more provocatively. Different events and locations will accommodate diverse styles.

Both Barbershop and Acapella genres can spawn good or bad performances. Different groups will be better at communicating with the audience in either style. But I believe that BHS has a more structured environment to help ANY singer have a good musical experience.

I love performing with you under the Barbershop Style umbrella. As we push our performances to be more visually appealing and as we select more music that audiences can identify with, we can draw more people in to grow as an entertainment producing organization while increasing our personal skills and enjoyment.


