Musical Director's Message:

I'd like to thank Brad Nieman for getting us singing tags during rehearsal. You are probably already aware that a tag is a dramatic variation usually in the last section of the song. It is similar to a coda in classical music. Tags are characterized by heightening the dramatic tension of the song, frequently including a hanger or sustained note against which the other singers carry the rhythm. Good tags can be sung as short, standalone works. Tags may be soft and tender or characterized by loud, "paint-peeling", ringing chords.

Usually, we are working hard to get the right notes and worship the chords as they get in tune. But because tags are usually short, they are good vehicles to:

- Practice reading music
- Try singing different parts
- Quartet with a variety of singers
- Stretch vocal skills like dynamics and range
- Develop memorization techniques
- Experience other musical styles
- Foster teaching methods

In addition to singing better, tag singing can give us the opportunity to work on our presentation skills. Take the extra effort to develop your personal visual plan. Share thoughts you have about making the mini-performance more dramatic. Work with the other singers in the group to bring out the best in each other. Watch the videos Brad is posting to see how your expression is. Use them to see what others are doing in the group that you might be able to emulate.

Some tags may be difficult and not work for the group you are singing in. The range might be too high or low – try lowering or raising the key. It may be too long to memorize - take it a section at a time and use music to help you remember. You'll usually find success but be ready to move on to another tag if it's not coming together.

Have fun creating a special sound you haven't before. As you try more, you'll become a better tag singer, and a better singer in general. Be careful though.... you might find yourself up all night singing tags at the next convention.
