Take a look at this 1,000 gram bar of iron.

At first glance, it might not seem like much — just raw material. Maybe a bit rusty, maybe a little rough around the edges. On its own? It's worth about \$100. Useful, sure. But nothing that turns heads.

But if you shape that bar into horseshoes — give it some form and function — its value jumps.

That's learning your part, blending your tone, staying in tune. That's a \$250 voice.

Now take it further. Carve it into sewing needles — refined, precise, focused. That's learning nuance. Diction. Dynamics. Emotional connection. That's \$70,000 worth of skill.

Still more? Forge it into tiny watch springs and gears — parts so delicate they drive the world's most intricate machines. That's tight synchronization, pure vowels, ringing chords. That's \$6 million worth of harmony.

But the highest calling? Precision laser parts — refined to absolute perfection. That's when your voice isn't just a sound... it's a tool of artistry. It lifts hearts. It stirs souls. It changes people. That's \$15 million-level singing.

But here's the thing:

None of that happens without heat.

Metal has to be **tempered** — heated, hammered, cooled, and shaped — again and again. That's rehearsal. That's tough coaching. That's showing up when it's hard, singing through the cracks, and leaning into growth. That's where your voice becomes strong. Flexible. Resonant.

The voice you were given? That's just your starting material.

Your value in this chorus doesn't lie in what you're made of — it's in how well you use it. How hard you train it. How deeply you care. How fully you give it.

So Portsmen, let's temper our voices.

Let's sing like we've been forged by fire and tuned by purpose — Sing like you're worth a fortune — because in harmony, we are.

The Ring is the Thing!

People often ask me, "What are you up to these days?" Now that I'm retired, that question usually morphs into, "What do you do with all your free time?" My answer? I fish, collect stamps, tumble rocks, travel with my wife—and I sing barbershop with the Stockton Portsmen. These are more than pastimes; they're passions. And while "free time" is a bit of a misnomer (time always has a cost), I find myself constantly weighing how I spend mine. Barbershop harmony keeps rising to the top.

Let me explain why.

Hooks are fascinating things. In fishing, a hook's barb ensures it stays in place—it becomes difficult to shake loose. Over time, these hooks evolve from casual interests into deep commitments. Singing with the Portsmen is one of those hooks for me. I'm drawn in, not just by the music, but by the people. The camaraderie. The blend of voices that makes harmony possible. I sing because this is part of who I am. A note alone isn't music—but as part of a chord, it becomes something magical.

The Stockton Portsmen are more than a chorus—they're a family. I've never met a more welcoming and genuinely kind group of folks. Under the strong leadership of Bill and Al, and with the spirit of everyone who contributes, our rehearsals often feel like scenes from a well-loved sitcom. Full of personality. Full of heart.

Barbershop isn't something you can do halfway—not if you want to feel that ring. For me, it's never been about doing things just "a little." When I commit, I dive in headfirst. But even with that drive, I still find myself asking: Why do I do this at all?

That's where the hook comes in.

Every hobby has its draw. For fishing, "the tug is the drug." For collecting, it's the thrill of discovery. For barbershop? It's the Ring—that magical overtone that happens when voices lock perfectly in tune. That *singing hook* first sank in when I was ten, attending a show with my great-uncle Rudy. It hooked deeper when I sang with my brothers as the Hunt Brothers in high school. Every time we sang again, the line tugged a little harder. The final set? Walking into a Stockton Portsmen rehearsal with my friend Mike Drouin. I felt it again when I matched notes with Tom on a hanger and my heart started racing.

The hook had found its home.

So Why Am I Doing This?

I do it for the ring.

I do it for the rush of perfect harmony.

I do it for the friendships that start with a handshake and grow over laughter and song. I do it because when we sing together—truly ring a chord—we become something more than ourselves.

This chorus has given me joy, connection, purpose, and that ever-elusive, spine-tingling *ring*. That's why I'm doing this. That's why I'll keep doing this. Because the ring is the thing—and I'm all in.

Yes! Clef Collaboration

Seth Yund reached out to his father, Steve Yund, with an unconventional request to see if the Portsmen could assist in training Seth's musical comedy improvisation group in the basics of vocal harmony. Well, here's a different challenge! Steve and Seth met a couple of times to narrow down exactly what was needed for the group. Three main areas were determined to be focal: 1) How to warm up for a vocal practices and how to prepare for performances; 2) How to sing well during practice and a vocal performance (what to think about, what to do, etc.); 3) An intro to harmonizing: what harmony is (very basically), examples, and how to harmonize (starting with 2-person harmony, working up to 3 and 4-part harmony if the group can handle it). The above was rested on a bit of proof that we knew what we were talking about. So, a song or two to earn respect was required. All in less than an hour. With the task defined, effort was put forth by Portsmen members to make is so.



Steve reasoned that since it is a comedy troupe of younger people and mixed gender, having a youthful and mixed gender profile of presenters would be important. So, Brad at Bass and Stephanie at Tenor were obvious choices. Nancy filled the Baritone, gender and the youthful energy requirement. Since Steve wasn't about to yield his opportunity to show off for his boy... he became the fourth for the quartet.

We met at the Ooley Theater in midtown Sacramento, a 34-seat delightful theater with decent acoustics for off microphone singing (The owner stopped in and offered the venue to us as she is looking to make a name for the theater as one that attracts quality acts, I reckon we sounded pretty good because she was talking about us)! We began at 7pm and immediately established our vocal "street cred" with Let me Call You Sweetheart and Coney Island Baby. The rest was step-wise instruction of the things we practice every week. Seth wanted his troupe to be able to sing at least two-part harmony. We got through 4- part Sleepy Time as a tag pretty well and then even worked on some woodshedding skills. The goals were met and everyone had a fun experience while being of service to the arts community and building goodwill regarding the skills of barbershoppers. All four of us Portsmen would do it again. One participant made a point of comparing what we did with the workshop she attended the week before. She indicated it was as good as the very talented bay area presenter, took less time, cost less and was much less stressful! A very affirming evening! Way to go Portsmen! We know what we are doing.
